According to the Regulation on the organisation and regulation of the gas sector, the company BH Gas manages the transport network in the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina, however, there is no legal basis for separation under the Third Energy Package because no law has been passed in the FBiH that regulates this area.

In the long run, the World Bank estimates that BiH's energy sector would require more than \$6 billion in investment for modernization, life extension, and new generation facilities for the power generation and coal mines sectors. BiH has significant renewable energy potential, particularly in hydropower and wind power capacity.

In addition, Bosnia and Herzegovina is converting its energy supply and transitioning to environmentally friendly production. As part of an Energy Community established by the EU and several South-East European countries, the country has committed itself to implementing applicable EU law in this area.

In March 2018, the first 50 MW Mesihovina wind power station was opened. In the ten months of its operation, it produced 103.5 GWh, equivalent to 0.58% of the total electricity generation in Bosnia and Herzegovina. Given that over 50% of Bosnia and Herzegovina's territory is under forests, energy from wood biomass also has large potential. In ...
