

Is aluminum a good storage material for hydrogen?

Now, in the JACS paper, Cheetham, Evans, and colleagues have tested the aluminum MOF for hydrogen storage. It stores just two-thirds as much gas as the nickel MOF. And with a binding energy of just 8.6 kJ/mol, it must be chilled to about -100°C to store its maximum amount of hydrogen.

Can aluminum be used as a source of hydrogen?

"Using aluminum as our source, we can 'store' hydrogen at a density that is ten times greater than if we just store it as a compressed gas." Along with hydrogen, the reactor also produces heat and green high-purity alumina. The exothermic heat from the reaction can be used to generate high-quality steam and hot water for industrial applications.

How do you store hydrogen in aluminum?

Simply move the aluminum and then react it with water on-site. "Fundamentally, the aluminum becomes a mechanism for storing hydrogen -- and a very effective one," says Douglas P. Hart, professor of mechanical engineering at MIT.

Can aluminum hydride store hydrogen?

Can aluminum & seawater make hydrogen fuel?

MIT engineers are optimizing this simple chemical reaction as an efficient and sustainable way to generate hydrogen fuel, which they envision can be used to power an engine or fuel cell aboard marine vessels and underwater vehicles. The team found that this reaction between aluminum and seawater successfully produces hydrogen gas, though slowly.
