

How do plants acquire limiting resources from soil?

Plants acquire limiting resources from soils through carbon investment belowground in root growth, exudates and symbiotic bacteria and fungi. Accelerated decomposition of soil organic matter fuelled by plant carbon inputs can enable plant nutrient uptake (the "priming effect" 22).

How much carbon can croplands store a year?

A 2017 study estimated that with better management, global croplands have the potential to store an additional 1.85 gigatons of carbon each year--as much as the global transportation sector emits annually. Moreover, some scientists believe soils could continue to sequester carbon for 20 to 40 years before they become saturated.

Why do soils store more carbon?

Soils with more organic material (bits of wood, decaying leaves, or dead creatures) can store more carbon because organic material easily binds loose carbon molecules and the organic material itself is stored as carbon.

How much land is used to produce food?

Why do natural forests store more carbon than plantation forests?

Natural forests store more carbon than plantation forests, due to complex stand structures and accumulation of carbon belowground and in the forest floor. These features take centuries to emerge. Mature natural forests provide significant additional benefits and must be conserved, whilst regeneration of secondary natural forests is promoted.
