South Korea has released a draft energy blueprint, in which the country plans to generate 70% of its power from carbon-free energy sources by 2038, from nearly 40% in 2023. To reach this objective, the draft plan notably indicates that South Korea intends to build up to three new nuclear reactors by 2038.

What percentage of South Korea's electricity is renewable?

According to Ember Climate, in 2020, wind and solar accounted for just 3.8% of South Korea's electricity. This is a mere 2.8% jump from 2015. Data from the Korea Energy Economics Institute (KEEI) reveals that renewables account for 6.4% of the country's energy mix.
