

Where can compressed air energy be stored?

The number of sites available for compressed air energy storage is higher compared to those of pumped hydro [1]. Porous rocks and cavern reservoirs are also ideal storage sites for CAES. Gas storage locations are capable of being used as sites for storage of compressed air.

What is compressed air energy storage?

Overview of compressed air energy storage Compressed air energy storage (CAES) is the use of compressed air to store energy for use at a later time when required[1]. Excess energy generated from renewable energy sources when demand is low can be stored with the application of this technology.

Can gas storage locations be used for compressed air storage?

Gas storage locations are capable of being used as sites for storage of compressed air. Today, several research activities are being carried out to explore the application of CAES on small scale projects, following their successful integration on large scale renewable energy systems [1].

What are the options for underground compressed air energy storage systems?

There are several options for underground compressed air energy storage systems. A cavity underground, capable of sustaining the required pressure as well as being airtight can be utilised for this energy storage application. Mine shafts as well as gas fields are common examples of underground cavities ideal for this energy storage system.

How many kW can a compressed air energy storage system produce?

CAES systems are categorised into large-scale compressed air energy storage systems and small-scale CAES. The large-scale is capable of producing more than 100MW, while the small-scale only produce less than 10 kW. The small-scale produces energy between 10 kW - 100MW.

What is an ocean-compressed air energy storage system?

Seymour [98, 99] introduced the concept of an OCAES system as a modified CAES system as an alternative to underground cavern. An ocean-compressed air energy storage system concept design was developed by Saniei et al. and was further analysed and optimized by Park et al.
