

How much electricity does Montenegro need?

With around 621 000 inhabitants, Montenegro's electricity needs are mainly met by the 225 MW lignite power plant at Pljevlja and the 307 MW Perucica and 342 MW Piva hydropower plants, all run by state-owned utility Elektroprivreda Crne Gore (EPCG).

Does Montenegro have a solar farm?

The Komarnica valley is also nominated as an Emerald and Natura 2000 site and includes the unique Nevidio Canyon, which is protected as a Natural Monument. Montenegro has so far made little use of its solar potential, but in 2018 a tender for a 250 MW solar farm was completed. However, its construction has been delayed by spatial planning issues.

Can Montenegro reduce energy demand?

Montenegro has great potential for reducing demand through more efficient energy use. According to IEA statistics, Montenegro's energy intensity has been falling slightly in recent years but is still more than twice that of the EU-28. Inefficient practices such as using electrical heaters for heating are widespread.

Should Montenegro build a hydropower plant?

As in other Balkan countries, the construction of small hydropower plants has caused widespread public outcry, but in 2020 they generated just 3 per cent of Montenegro's electricity. Against the fluctuating background of hydropower generation, difficult decisions need to be taken on the Pljevlja lignite power plant and nearby mines.

Can Montenegro expand its natural gas capacity?

Different sources cite varying levels of potential, but all show that a significant expansion of capacity is possible. Montenegro has no infrastructure for natural gas distribution and does not currently extract oil, though the government is interested in oil and gas production in the Adriatic Sea.

Does Montenegro have a natural gas pipeline?

EPCG plans to offer the installation of solar panels for another 5,000 consumers. After all these projects are finished, Montenegro could get solar power plants on roofs with more than 100 MW installed, equivalent to a new power plant. The Solari 3,000+ and Solari 500+ projects are expected to provide solar panels with a capacity of 30 MW.
