

What is the Slovenian energy policy?

The purpose of the measure is to accelerate the deployment of investments in renewable energy production and energy storage, with the aim to foster the transition to a net-zero economy. The Commission found that the Slovenian scheme is in line with the conditions set out in the Temporary Crisis and Transition Framework.

Do solar power plants need a building permit in Slovenia?

Solar power plants with the maximum power of up to 1MW are, according to the Decree, considered small power plants and do not require a building permit to be installed. The Decree simplifies investing in renewables and is a welcome change as procedures for obtaining building permits in Slovenia can be time-consuming. 3.

What are the main sources of electricity in Slovenia?

A paid subscription is required for full access. Nuclear power is the most used source of electricity production in Slovenia. In 2022, nuclear power plants accounted for 42 percent of total electricity generation. Coal-fired and hydropower plants followed, each making up approximately 24 percent of power production that year.

How much energy does Slovenia use?

Almost half of Slovenia's total energy consumption consists of imported petroleum purchased on global markets. Russia provides most of Slovenia's natural gas, which accounts for 12 percent of overall energy consumption. Slovenia uses approximately 0.8 billion cubic meters of gas annually.

Does Slovenia have gas storage facilities?

Slovenia does not have gas storage facilities, with companies dependent on infrastructure in Austria and Croatia. Slovenia has expressed interest in securing U.S. LNG sources via terminals in Krk, Croatia, or Rovigo, Italy, to diversify its supply away from Russia.

How much does electricity cost in Slovenia?

Slovenia, September 2022: The price of electricity is 0.295 U.S. Dollar per kWh for households and 0.186 U.S. Dollar for businesses which includes all components of the electricity bill such as the cost of power, distribution and taxes.

By the end of 2022, 30,557 solar power plants had been installed in Slovenia, with a total capacity of 632 MW, representing 301 W per person and 6.3% of all energy. This year the total capacity already exceeded 1 GW.

Most of the new capacity is in the commercial sector (52%), followed by small solar plants (35%) and large solar plants (10%).
